On April 29, Louisiana Garden Club Federation officials informed me that the City of Monroe won their 2019 Cleanest City Contest for Category I. After advancing from the District competition this past March, Monroe advanced to the state level judging in April and competed against Alexandria and Lake Charles in the Population Category I.

We are Monroe Proud to receive this award. Our city is cleaner and moving in the right direction. It is a testament to the hard work of our Keep Monroe Beautiful Director Greg Smith, Public Works and Code Enforcement personnel. The competition was close, but I am very proud of Monroe for having placed first in the LGCF Cleanest City Contest for 2019.”

The primary goal of the LGCF Cleanest City Contest is to become a litter free Louisiana. The contest is over 60 years old. Volunteer judges visit participating cities and rate them on cleanliness. Cities are categorized by population (Groups A-J).

Keep Monroe Beautiful Executive Director Greg Smith adds, “This was a team effort. I want to thank Public Works Director Tom Janway, Superintendent Roshonda Gospel, Solid Waste Supervisor James DeTiege, Beautification Supervisor Kevin Turner, Administrative Assistant Mary Williams, and their personnel.
